Kamp Famous Store building is encribed in brick the still-discernible words "Opera House". The second story of this building was occupied by the telephone exchange from 1907, and the Eastern Star had meeting rooms there. Access was by a dark steep staircase, dirty and scary. The north east block housed a variety store, Highfill's Mercantile, the post office, Utley's Drug Store and the hotel. Other businesses were: Caneer drug Store, Harkey's Grocery, O'Connor's Meat Market, L. A. Montgomery Dry Goods, Gib Smith's Pool Hall and Liquor Store, Uther Bird Garage, Arthur Davis Drug Store, the Owl Drug Store, Caneer Grocery, Williamson

Hardware. The post office moved around. It was in the northwest block, moved north of the present street light in the funeral home building, to near the old Dixie Theater, and finally to its present location near the City Hall. Above the old Booker grocery was a loft occupied by Wilcox - who made studio photographs.

During Senath's 100 years, there have been many other businesses, including two banks, two hotels, two hardware stores, three drug stores, many grocery stores, dry good stores, service stations, restaurants, taverns, and theatres.
