Harvey Jobe and family, who have been visiting with his parents here, returned to their home near Morley Sunday.

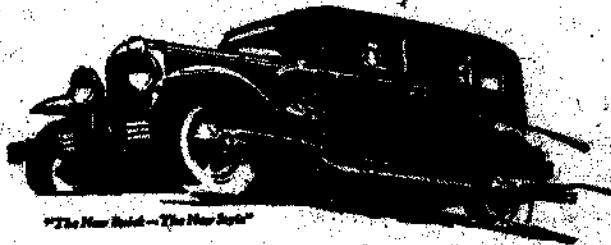
Mr. and Mrs. George Hawkins of Graysboro visited at the Jake Smith home Monday. Aunt Polly returned home with them for an extended visit.
