Matthew Stillman Cotterell

One of the old Scotch settlers, coming from the Highlands of Scotland in this very location in 1857, and at that time there was not a single white man's residence between him and the Manitoba line. He located here and began farming, taking up a pre-emption right where the town now stands. His nearest market for years was Kaneville, Iowa, now known as Council Bluffs, crossing the Missouri by ferry in the summer and on the ice in the winter. Omaha was then a town of about 1,400 population. The first stage line passing up the valley was in 1858 and went as far as Fort Kearney. The buffalo, Indian and grasshopper were the only close neighbors Mr Cotterell had for many years.

Mr Cotterell has one of the finest residences in the city, surrounded by beautiful flowers, shade and evergreen trees and a beautiful lawn. He also owns some 100 lots in the business and residence part of the city, ranging in price from \$25 to \$50. Mr Cotterell is a philanthropist and a great public benefactor. He and his good and lovely wife have enjoyed their golden wedding. They have no children of their own but they adopted a child while at the age of two years and we find that that boy is James H Bolton of Sioux City, Iowa, well known all over Northwestern Iowa. Mr Cotterell is a ship builder by trade and helped to put the first steam ship on Lake Superior.

THE PRESS

Among the noble industries and true enterprises in North Bend we find the newspaper. Every week two newspapers are issued and sent broadcast from North Bend, advocating her interest and noting her prosperity as regular as the bell calls the sinners to church. Of course some of the sinners don't heed the call, likewise the sinners are unmindful of the press and its usefulness.

THE ARGUS

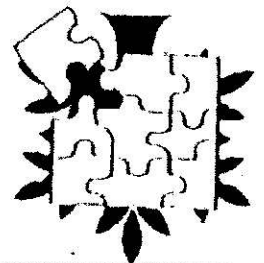
People's Independent Paper, was established here in April 1890, by Chas S Fowler, who has been running the same for six years and was a farmer prior to coming to this city. The Argus is enjoying a healthy advertising patronage and has a constantly interesting subscription list and a good job office.

THE REPUBLICAN

The oldest newspaper in the city, edited by J C Newsom is a six column quarto. Mr Newsom, who has been in business seven years is a practical newspaper man and printer and is getting out a fine country paper. It has a good job office and the only cylinder press in the city. The paper is enjoying a good advertising patronage and has a constantly increasing subscription list, a fact we are pleased to note.

THE OPERA HOUSE

The North Bend Opera House Association with a capital stock of \$10,000, have a fine brick building 40 x 90 with 400 opera chairs, stage 24x44 with good dressing rooms. Ernest Kern is the manager, T J Kastle, president; W W Roberts, treasurer; J Mason Smith and C Cusack, directors.
