Another month has come and gone. The Saunders County cemetery index is almost finished, have only Ashland and Sunrise remaining and they are very large.

The gardens at the Museum are in full bloom, if you have not been there, you should go within the next couple of weeks to see the blooms in their finest. While I was not supposed to be out and about (because of pollen) I went anyway and they are out of this world, so many new flowers I've not been able to name. Now I will remain inside for hopefully another few weeks.

The queries continue to arrive either by letter or by e-mail, and Claire and Renee continue to check out the wants of these persons. Even Jeff gets involved. At present time we are attempting to locate the old Fremont (first one) cemetery and the Catholic cemetery of the 1850's. We are quite sure we have the old Fremont burying grounds (as they called them), but are unsure of the old Catholic cemetery. Old maps of the government surveyor's in the 1850's do not designate such cemeteries. So the mystery continues. They did not always use deeds at that time, but just set aside ground for the burials.

Still reading the old papers for items for our newsletters and the Roots & Leaves, whether they be most interesting or calls for a laugh- you know that the newsletters were started in 1972, and the quarterlies followed in 1974-5 era, so now we find so many of the articles were printed at one time or another, and calls for careful checking of old items.

August is the only month that does not have any legal holidays or ones that are celebrated by all. Local happenings are difficult to find unless you rely on the old newspapers, and hope something new will appear that is newsworthy. While Claire tries to not make a reprint, sometimes it does happen, also with proofing, but when you read the newspapers now, they apparently no longer use proofreaders as the errors abound and spell check does not catch all of them.

Burials on private land often come to the attention of our society and perhaps several will be published in this newsletter. Remember these were found in the years of 1975-76, so it is not known if they still exist.

In 1978, Alberta Schmidt Martens reported the following burials in Elkhorn Twp, in a grove of trees, north of the Schmidt home:

Maria (Schmidt) 22 Mar 1877 26 Jul 1878

August (Schmidt) 10 May 1884 14 May 1884

Daniel or David (Schmidt) 22 Nov 1888 2 Dec 1888

These Clemen(t)s markers found north and west of North Bend, located in the trees in Union township in 1975. Since then, the grove of trees were cleared out for farming, however the 3 markers still stand:

John Clemens (note t is missing)

d 5 Mar 1885 age 61 years

Mary Clements, Lamented wife of John Clements

d 28 Dec 1869 age 51 years

Edward Clements

14 Oct 1858 31 Mar 1899

South of the Jalapa P.O. historical marker in Sec 4 of Nickerson Twp, the following information on a U-Beam the following:

Jane D T Campbell 19 Jul 1859 22 Feb 1861

Schuyler C Campbell 4 Aug 1868 22 Sep 1868

Both lie buried about __rods east of this marker. Marker built by Clarence Reckmeyer in 1936 A.D.

At the Arlington NE cemetery is the following marker:

Henry C Campbell 1st Postmaster of Jalapa P O of Dodge Co, NE established Jan 18, 1859

Born May 12, 1831

Died while Warden of Nebraska State Penitentiary 5 Aug 1873.

The Jalapa post office was discontinued 11 Jul 1870.

In 1894 the following newspaper article appeared in the Fremont Tri-Weekly Tribune.

Died - Campbell - At Pasadena, California, March 22, 1894. Frances Malloy-Campbell, widow of the late Henry C Campbell, aged 63 years.

The deceased was one of the early settlers in Dodge county, coming here in 1858. The interment will take place at Arlington.

There are numerous other family plots scattered about Dodge County, and most have been reported to us and were visited and photos taken, unless they are in unmarked graves.

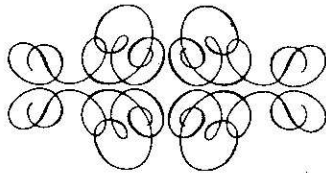

Elmer Hubler and Miss Elsie Lewis both of Scribner, were married Wednesday at the court house in Fremont, County Judge Stinson officiating.

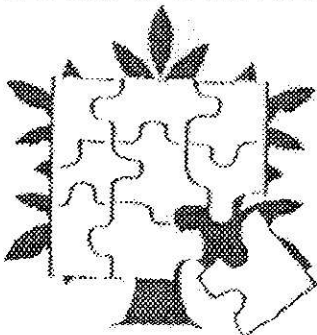

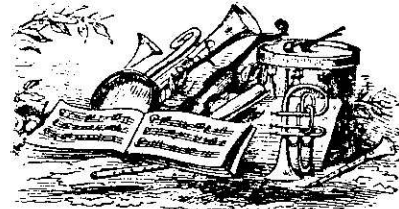
The NORTH BEND CEMENT and TILE FACTORY plant is now complete and tile and cement blocks are being turned out in large quantities every day. Manager Lillie has had some trouble in getting some of the machinery installed but he now enjoys the satisfaction of seeing all his plans for a first class modern cement factory fulfilled. The machinery is working perfectly and the plant has every convenience for handling its product. Those who have not visited the plant since its completion would be well repaid by a visit and they would doubtless be agreeably surprised at the number and excellence of the various cement products that are being manufactured.

Work on the NORTH BEND GRAIN Company's new elevator is also progressing rapidly. As the building gets higher up Contractor Crammer is having some difficulty in holding his men, some of whom have not been accustomed to working that far from solid ground. The elevator when completed will be seventy-five feet high.

The big stone building on west Sixth street, the first floor of which is to be the home of the North Bend Automobile company, and the second floor the Modern Woodmen Hall, is now well under way and the stone work will be finished within a few days.
