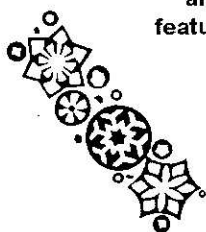

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## 7 INCHES MORE

Reign of Sleds Continues-Another Snow Adds to Season's  
Big Record

Commencing in a small-sized blizzard about 3 o'clock this morning a heavy snowstorm prevailed today. At three 3'clock this afternoon it had snowed continuously for twelve hours and seven inches of the white substance spread over the frozen blanket of previous snows amounting to close to thirty inches, stood in mute, fine testimony to the effectiveness of the feathery precipitation. The reign of sleighing has been unquestionably restored for a period at least of many days and along with its pleasures come also the necessity for prompt action with the snowshovel an prospect for increasing coal bills. Fremont is in the grip of the severest winter weather it has known for several years.

The snowfall was general over Nebraska. Reports from many towns east and west received at the telegraph offices were that it was snowing.

A wind prevailed for two hours before daylight and there was considerable drifting. People who awoke early to find the cold flakes sifting in thru slightly-open windows looked for daylight to bring a fierce storm. The wind, however subsided.

The lowest temperature dip here this morning was four degrees below zero. It was 10 below at Norfolk and is below at Alliance.

Sixty-seven numbers were sold, and sixty seven couples participated in the dance, all of which seemed to realize that "youth is the time for pleasure." A large and pleasant crowd from North Bend and the country adjacent was in attendance, and we are assured that they appreciated all attentions shown them and enjoyed the pleasures of the hour, as only those can who feel surrounded by friends.

Turner Hall

Friday night the Turner Society of this place gave their first ball of the season, which was the largest party ever assembled in Turner Hall, over sixty tickets were sold, and to the splendid music of the Pebble Creek Band, the merry dancers went thro' the steps of Waltz, Polka, Schottische, Quadrille, etc. Weich provided a handsome and bountiful supper of which all partook. The occasion passed off pleasantly and our German friends enjoyed themselves as they know so well how to do.
