ON NEW YEAR'S EVE some of the youthful portion of our community thought to wake our citizens to the fact that "1870" had been born by ringing the bell of the Congregational Church. One staid and sober(?) citizen was suddenly awakened thereby, and supposing it to be an alarm of fire struck for down town *en deshabelle*. Meeting some young men on a corner he inquired where the fire was - they politely informed him there was no fire. By this time he had become fully awake and an examination of what he supposed a water bucket disclosed the fact that he had brought a *coal* scoop with which to carry water to the fire. One of his neighbors similarly alarmed turned out with a *horse collar*.

Miss Frieda Schroeder, niece of the groom was bridesmaid and Mr Alphen Haney, of Dixon, Nebr., brother of the bride, was best man.

The wedding march was played by Mrs D C Allen as the bridal party took their places in the front parlor before a bank of potted plants and ferns, where the marriage lines were read that made them husband and wife.

Forty relatives and intimate friends of the contracting parties were privileged to witness the ceremony at the close of which, after hearty congratulations and best wishes, a four course dinner was served.

The bride wore a beautiful wedding gown of white flaxen trimmed in lace and carried white carnations. The bridesmaid wore a pretty dress of tan chiffon faille and carried pink carnations. The rooms were tastily decorated, for the occasion with potted plants, ferns and bouquets of pink and white carnations.

The happy couple left on the afternoon train for a several weeks' wedding trip to Kansas City, and points in southern Kansas, where they will visit relatives. The brides' going away dress was of dark blue serge.

The bride is the youngest daughter of Mr & Mrs Michael Haney. She grew to young womanhood in this vicinity, where she is highly respected and has a host of friends and well-wishers. She was a successful school teacher, having taught in this vicinity last year.

The groom has lived here since boyhood and is an industrious young man, who is held in high esteem by all. He is a carpenter by trade.

The worthy couple were the recipients of numerous useful and beautiful wedding gifts.

Upon their return they will be at home to their friends after March 15 in the Fred Henzpetter residence on the hill recently purchased by the groom.

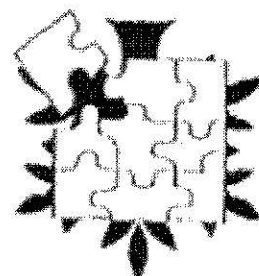
