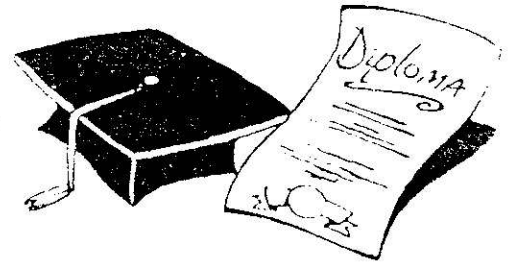

The 1907 Flood of Fremont became an item of interest to a student at Midland this past week. He made contact with the Museum, however, they did not have anything on the early flooding from the Platte, so they made inquiry at ENGS. Yes, Claire was sure she had the copy and he arrived at the door shortly thereafter. In the library was the typewritten story from Roots & Leaves, but she had also saved the original copy from the paper of February 1907. This covered several days of writing each day by the news editors. Needless to say the student left with smiles on his face, with a copy in his hand. It is such a pleasure to have someone arrive at the door seeking out old history of the county or even one of the towns, and be able to supply the persons with something printed in the papers, or at least a start to seek out further information. We have many of the old newspapers on microfilm, however, the years of 1880 is a "bummer" the issues are almost all missing. Remember, when searching for information, that in early times from mid 1870's to about 1927, we had TWO newspapers, The Fremont Tribune and also the Fremont Herald. Both printed are a daily, a semi-weekly, and tri-weekly and weekly. All of the newspapers are on microfilm and located in the Keene Memorial Library, Fremont, The ENGS has many of the early papers, however, due to the high price of the microfilm(\$75.00each) we have to be very selective.

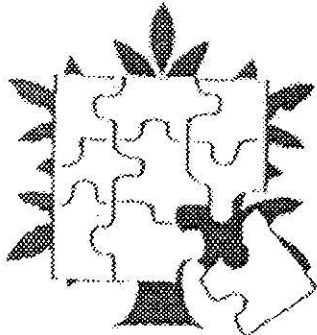

Mr Pfeiffer bade the wedding guests good evening and marched off with the committee. In front of the store a band was in waiting and the newly-wedded young man was invited to head a procession on the street. Later the charivariers appeared a second time to demand an introduction to the bride. The new Mrs Pfeiffer came out and the band struck up a lively air in her honor. Afterwards the charivari party was treated to light refreshments. Mr Pfeiffer and his bride are occupying the groom's cottage near the corner of Eleventh and D.

Mr Bucholz is one of Hooper's prominent and successful young business men, and enjoys the confidence of a large acquaintance of friends in this vicinity.
