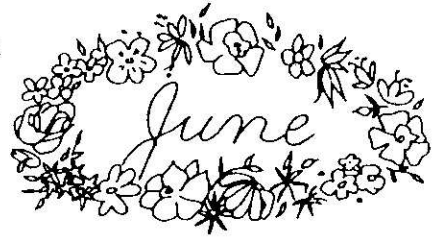

Jeff made excellent recovery from his heart attack. He is back at work at the May Museum and is now able to work on your programs.

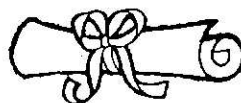
Memorial Day is now past and we look forward to July 4th. It seems strange to look out my south windows and see no cars at the high school. That means I can get out of my driveway at any time.

Andersonville Prison

This article was noted in the 22 Jun 1882 Fremont Weekly these valiant men who suffered during the Civil War and were men from Dodge County. This article is a bit different.

The newspaper article

There are a number of the survivors of the Andersonville prison pen in Fremont, among whom, we believe, are John W Goff and Geo W Pettibone. Among all the dreadful experience of that terrible place it was found necessary to organize a vigilance committee to protect the men from desperate characters among themselves.

In the records of Andersonville we find that separated from the other graves stands six stones, marking the burial place of six men who, like human friends, preyed upon the weakness and helplessness of their suffering companions in the wretched prison pen, robbing them of food, of clothing, and often of life. These six were, unfortunately, not the only ones of that class, but being ring leaders, were tried by a court of their own comrades, convicted and sentenced to be hanged, which sentence was executed by their comrades July 11, 1864.

They were hanged from a scaffold erected for the purpose just inside of the stockade. The names of these men were John Sarsfield, 244th New York; William Collins, 88th Pennsylvania; Charles Curtis Battery A 5th Rhode Island Artillery; Pat Delaney, 83rd Pennsylvania; A Mun, United States Navy; and W R Rickson, United States Navy.

CEMETERY - FREMONT 21 June 1869

Met pursuant to adjournment. Special committee on new cemetery grounds reported in favor of the west half of the southwest quarter of the northeast quarter of Section 10, Township 17, Range 6.

On motion the meeting adjourned to meet July 6th.

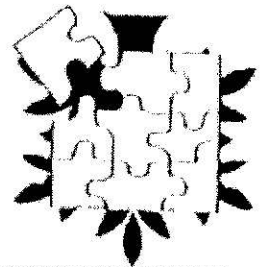
The committee appointed for that purpose to ask owners of lots in the present cemetery to exchange for lots in the new cemetery, and report the result at the next meeting.

Fremont Tribune 25 Jun 1869 3:3

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Five emigrant families, wagons, and a large number of loose stock crossed the Platte river here last week on their way to new homes in Butler county. One old pioneer, in deerskin vest, seemed rather apprehensive of Indians in his new home, but his face lightened up considerably when told that the skins were many miles west of Butler county, and with the philosophical remark "who's afeared," went on his way rejoicing.

Fremont Tribune 18 Jun 1869 3:2

An attempt was made by the prisoners confined in our county jail to escape, on last Wednesday evening. The prisoners became possessed of an old case-knife by some means, and with the same cut a hole in the floor of the court-room, and were getting into the second story, when the guard, suspicioned that all was not right, went up stairs and surprised the candidates for liberty by appearing on the upper side of the hole. With a request not to shoot, the fellow who was about half way free, let go and dropped to the floor. The sheriff has now secured them in such manner that they are not afraid of getting away.
