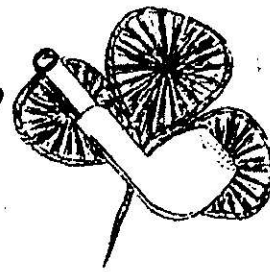

BECOMES VILLAGE

Thriving Town of Nickerson is
Incorporated.

Board of Trustees Named to Hold Office Till Regular Election
in Spring

The thriving town of Nickerson, ten miles north of Fremont,
has been incorporated by the Dodge county board in
accordance with a petition signed by forty-four voters in the
town. About 120 acres are included in the village limits.

A village board of trustees consisting of H J Sidner, L H
Westerhoff, Guy R Stewart, F B Wood and C M Warn, has
been named to serve until the regular election in the spring
at which time the voters of the village will have the privilege
of electing trustees for the ensuing year. Not an objection to
the incorporating of the village was filed, all the residents
being apparently in favor of the move.

Nickerson has been growing gradually for years, and of late
rather extensive improvement in the way of cement walks
and new buildings have been made.

Noted in Fremont Tri-Weekly Tribune 6 Oct 1910 3:7

February appeared to be another snowy, icy month and we
had 9 members come thru the cold and icy streets and
highways. March has to get better!

Nona and Claire told of their tour of Rome and the Tuscan
Hills in northern Italy.

The index of births, marriages and deaths have now reached
to November of 1910. Many new and unusual items appeared
through the year of 1910, and will be used for the Roots &
Leaves, in the coming months.

Also copied from an original newspaper of 1864 Cincinnati
Daily Commercial, a very long list of soldiers who were
placed in the hospitals with injuries received during that time
period. It does not list where the soldier was from, but does
give his military unit. We felt a copy of this newspaper might
help someone seeking information about the soldier.
Unfortunately, it is not indexed, very small print and runs in
two pages. Margie volunteered to index the material. This is
a sample of what the article contains:

On Thursday afternoon March 10th 1910, at 2 o'clock at the home of the groom, five miles northwest of here, occurred the marriage of Miss Amelia Klusendorf to Mr Henry Meyer in the presence of a large number of invited guests, Rev H C Jul Frese officiating.

The couple was attended by Miss Alma Sass as bridesmaid and Mr John Ahlers of Naper, Nebr, who filled the position of the best man.

The bride looked charming in her beautiful gown of white silk and bridal veil. She carried a bouquet of white roses. The bridesmaid was attired in a lovely white embroidered Swiss dress and carried pink roses. The groom and best man wore the usual black.

The home was prettily decorated for the occasion with wedding bells and cut flowers in pink and white. After congratulations and best wishes, a bounteous wedding dinner was served. Many valuable and useful gifts were received.

The happy couple went to housekeeping at once in the home from which they were married and previously furnished by the groom.

INDIAN DOUBLE WEDDING

Five Hundred Sioux and Two Hundred Whites at Elaborate Function.

Sioux Falls S.D. April 18-1910. Five hundred Sioux Indians from the Rosebud, Pine Ridge, Cheyenne River and other reservations of the state gathered at the camp of Little Crow, a leading warrior of the Brule Sioux tribe, on the Rosebud reservation, to participate in one of the most elaborate Indian weddings of modern times. White people to the number of about 200 also gathered to witness the unique event, making a temporary camp of about 700 people who had been drawn to the scene of the Indian wedding.

The wedding was a double one, the principals being Jesse Leaneagh, a white man, connected with the H E ranch at Cut Meat, and Ida Louise Little Crow, daughter of Chief Little Crow, who is one of the wealthiest chiefs of the Sioux nation, and David Thigh, a young Sioux of the Lower Brule tribe, and Nellie Yellow Fox, daughter of Yellow Fox, a prominent Sioux tribesman. The ceremony took place in Advent Episcopal church, Rev B P Lambert and Rev Dallis Shaw, both Episcopal priests of the Rosebud reservation officiating. It was a full ring ceremony and the marriage rites were pronounced in both English and Dacotah or Sioux. A wedding dinner followed.

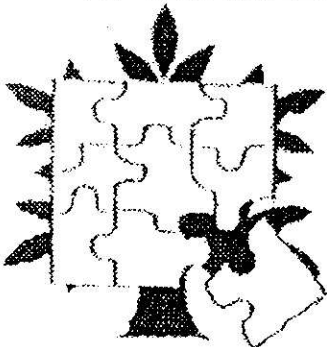
