Omaha, Sept. 21. – The historical parade, to be given by Ak-Sar-Ben this year, will surpass any previous effort of its kind. This parade will show every step in the development of Nebraska from its territorial days to its present days of prosperity and influence.

There will be more than forty groups, of subgroups of about fifteen each, dealing with various phases of Nebraska life. These floats will be horse and oxen drawn.

The oxen are being brought from all part of the United States, where such means of transportation is still in vogue. President Buckingham has just received his first consignment of oxen which came all the way from Canada. The oxen are being acclimated to modern life that there will be no upsets during the parade.

Nebraska's fiftieth anniversary of statehood is to be fittingly celebrated and Ak-Sar-Ben is to be congratulated on the elevating and educational exhibition it is preparing for the pleasure and education of the millions of subjects of King Samson.

MANY NEW CITIZENS

Clerk Cruickshank of the District Court Finds Large Number Of Foreign-Born Americans.

Since the inauguration of the new naturalization law here, Clerk J. M. Cruickshank of the district court, who has the power to grant citizenship papers to applicants, has found that there are many foreign-born Americans living in Dodge County who desire to legally become subjects of Uncle Sam.

The number of applications for papers filed has been much larger than anticipated and necessitated Clerk Cruickshank's ordering an additional supply of blanks.

Yesterday, application for first papers was made by John Cloney, whose birthplace was Wexford, Ireland.

Peter Emanuel Rasmussen Buck of Norway was an applicant for first papers, and Daniel Buck of Norway asked for final citizenship papers.
