County Clerk Kerkow has received notice from State Auditor Wallich's that the superintendent of the hospital for the insane has filed a certified statement showing that there is due the state from Dodge county \$321.86 for maintaining the following persons during the quarter ending November 30<sup>th</sup>: Joseph Kurko, Celia M Johnson, Asa Amsburg, Diedrich Meyer, Mary Sorenson, Jens Peter Flarup, John Oxford, August Kroeger, Jas R Watson.

There are many wonderful stories within the pages of our old newspapers which are on microfilm, not just Fremont newspapers but also the other new and upcoming towns with starting a new town, school, church, and the stores in their downtown areas.

(Claire saved many of the old newspapers – that were due to be burned or placed in "the dump". The bulk of the old Fremont newspapers were saved, but the State said they were a fire hazard to the building of the newspaper depts and had to get rid of the newspapers, so Claire with the help of Nona Wiese we piled them in pick-ups or car trunks and took them to Scribner and placed in an empty building. Then Claire started the huge job of going through all of the throw-out papers and clipping and gluing the many articles that are now a part of ENGS news items of people coming and going. ( Don't overlook the many file drawers of clippings at the east end of our meeting room.)

### TOWN NAMED – Lincoln, Journal.

The new town of Uehling on the Ashland cut off of the Great Northern Railway has been located and platted at a point three miles south of the southeastern corner of Cuming county. It is named after Oswald Uehling of Hooper, the owner of the land upon which it will be built. Being eighteen miles away, it is not expected that the new town will materially injure the trade of West Point, the nearest railroad town at present being Hooper.

UEHLING – The item reprinted from a Lincoln paper saying that a new town northeast of Hooper is to be named for Oswald Uehling and was erroneous in the first cognomen. The town is to be known as Uehling, but it is named for Theodore Uehling who donated twenty acres for depot and yard purposes.

## Continuation of Uehling's New Bank

Work on the new building for the newly organized Logan Valley Bank, will be commenced at the new town of Uehling, today. The contractor having the carpenter work is Joseph Sauers, of Hooper. A frame building, modern in every way will be put up. Its dimensions will be 44x22, and 12 foot ceiling. It will have a corner entrance and plate glass doors and windows. There will be in it a suitable Vault and other accessories for the banking business. Mr. Sauers expects to have the building ready for the plasterers by the 15<sup>th</sup> of the present month.

The stockholders of this new Dodge county financial institution met recently, and chose a board of directors as follows:

Oscar Bergquist, J. G. Osterloh, A. M. Tillman, Frank McGivern, Charles Arnot. The directors elected Charles Arnot, president and A. M. Tillman, vice-president.

The rumor had gained credence that Mr. Arnot would act as cashier for the new bank. That gentleman when questioned by the Herald yesterday, made the following statement: "My term of office as county superintendent expires at a time when there are no desirable positions in the school line open, and the management of the new bank having asked me to go to Uehling and take charge of its business, I shall do so until the first annual meeting which will be held next June. At that time, or before, I shall endeavor to secure a satisfactory position in my own chosen profession."

Mr. Arnot speaks in glowing language of the prospects of the new town of Uehling. It is admirably located to make a place of some considerable importance, being far enough distant from other places to have a tributary territory all its own. Four elevators are under way, three or four implement houses, four hardware stores and as many general merchandising establishments. All these with two banks will make quite a commercial center.

**SNYDER ITEMS** - Four children died in Snyder within two months from direct cause of diphtheria.

We understand Mr Durst, living two and a half-miles north of Snyder, has also three children sick with diphtheria. Herman Wolsieger's daughter Katie was also sick with the predominating epidemic - Advertiser.

## BANK OPENS TODAY.

Dodge, May 16. The new bank at Dodge will begin business today. It will be called the Dodge State Bank, with James Harris, as president, Bert Hasson, as cashier, and J L Brown, Vice-president. The directors are W. D. Auld, of Lincoln; Dr Parchen, of Snyder; James Harris, Eugene Long, J. H. Montgomery, John Longacre and Dr I. E. Atkinson. The stockholders consist of fifteen farmers, six professional and business men, three capitalists and several lady subscribers. The bank starts out with a paid up capital of \$10,000, and will do business in the brick building west of Dr. Atkinson's drug store. The directors have put in a first-class vault and new time lock safe and the Fremont Tribune captured the bid for all book and stationery work.
