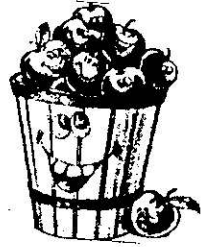

Claire was busy inside all of the months from May thru August reading the old microfilmed county newspapers. All of the Dodge Criterion up to end of 1902; All of the North Bend Argus; North Bend Republican; and the start of the North Bend Eagle thru 1902; on to Hooper Sentinel thru 1902 and presently in the Scribner Rustler. All of the old Scribner News items have been searched. Total 3x5 cards used approximately 2500 to 3000 cards. I did not keep track, but it seemed like either Margie or Claire was purchasing "on sale" cards. When these are all filed, it will mean a shift in our card file drawers of 40 used. We still have sufficient file drawers to add the cards. They consist of births, marriages and obituaries, with a cross reference on the marriages, as the initial card is filed under the groom's name.

Some very interesting early time articles were clipped and eventually will be used as news items in our newsletter or in the Roots & Leaves quarterly.

The Fremont Tribune and Herald have the best place to seek out the earliest info, as they started in the 1868 and 1877 eras.

I have found articles in the county newspapers that were not in the Fremont newspapers, so I always clip and I can always shred the duplicates. And don't forget, there are many of the old newspapers missing, it pays to check all of them.

There are many drownings in the old papers, where the 'boys' have gone into the river to bathe thinking they were on the bottom sand, when they step into a hole and are gone by the current in the river. Some very sad occurrences also appear with Suicides.

Arlington Fire

The town of Arlington, seven miles east of Fremont, was the scene of a disastrous fire early Tuesday morning. Seven business houses were burned and the total loss amounts to but \$17,000 with about \$6000 insurance.

The fire was the work of incendiaries. Attempts were made to start a blaze in five different places and in three places the fire fiends were successful.

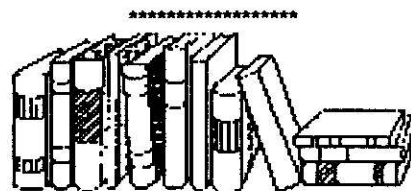
The spread of the flames was so rapid that they could not be checked and the fire burned until it burned itself out.

Detectives have been employed to hunt down the incendiary and it is expected that some arrests will soon follow.

Noted in North Bend Republican 30 Sep 1897 5:2

Then on 11 Nov 1897 in the North Bend Eagle I noted this article:

Mrs Barber, who was arrested with Geo Knights at Arlington on the charge of setting fire to the town has confessed that Knights did the job—found in Scribner News.
